CHAPTER 12 SPENDING BEHAVIOURS AMONG COLLEGE STUDENTS FROM B40 HOUSEHOLDS

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INTRODUCTION

Transforming from relying on parents to being independent financially, there seems to be a habit that is maintained by the United States young adults throughout their lives (Jorgensen, 2016). Arnett (2000) proposed how emerging adulthood are those in between the age of adolescence and adulthood which tend to become more independent as time passes by.
